Rose Photography Show at Tenarky Winter Workshop

The 1st Annual (we hope) Tenarky District Winter Workshop Photography Contest will be held at the 2016 winter workshop in Bowling Green, KY, February 19-21, 2016. The photo contest is open to any photographer who has registered for the 2016 Tenarky Winter Workshop.

- Photos must be taken by the exhibitor, but do not have to be roses that belong to the exhibitor. Exhibitors are limited to three entries per class. Photos must be entered prior to 8:45 a.m. on Saturday morning.
- Each photo entry must be a 4x6" print in a 5x7" matt of any color. Orientation may be landscape or portrait. A photo may be entered in only one class. All roses, gardens and activities must be correctly identified. Rose photos will be evaluated by the judges using the score card on the Tenarky website.
- All photos entered will be on display and judged Saturday morning to determine the top three in each class. The top photo in each class will be determined by workshop attendees. From these seven photos, the top three overall winners will be decided by the judges. Certificates will be presented at the Saturday night banquet. The judges' decision is final.
- Exhibitors must completely fill out an ARS horticulture OR arrangement entry tag and paperclip it to the upper left corner of the photo. The exhibitor may place nothing identifying the photographer on the front of the photograph; however, the photographer's name should be on the back of the photo (sticker may be used) in case the tag is misplaced.
- All rights to the submitted photos are retained by the owners of the photos. However, by entering the contest, the owner agrees to allow the Tenarky District of the American Rose Society to display photos at the Winter Workshop and publish photos in the District Newsletter, KATnips, the district website and on the district Facebook page along with Tenarky local society newsletters.
- The Photography Committee and Judges will exercise due caution to protect all exhibits, but neither the American Rose Society, Tenarky District Society, nor the hotel will assume any liability in loss or damage to the photography.

Please note the following definitions:

An exhibition bloom is a specimen that has one bloom per stem without side buds at its most perfect phase of possible beauty. An exhibition bloom is generally one-half to two-thirds open, gracefully shaped with sufficient petals symmetrically arranged in a circular outline, and tending to a high center. An open bloom must have the stamens showing. A spray has two or more blooms per stem with or without unopened side buds. Roses classified as single or semi-double roses by the ARS are generally at their most perfect phase when fully open.

- Class 1 One Exhibition Bloom, Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora no side buds
- Class 2 One Exhibition Bloom, Miniature or Miniflora no side buds
- Class 3 One Exhibition Bloom from any variety not listed in Classes 1 and 2 no side buds
- Class 4 One Open Bloom, stamens must show any type of rose (singles are permitted) no side buds
- Class 5 One Spray, two or more blooms, any type of rose
- Class 6 A Rose Arrangement (identify arranger, if known)
- Class 7 A Rose Garden should show the use of roses within the structure of a garden (identify garden)
- Class 8 A Rose Society Activity (identify society and activity)
- Class 9 Rose Art A photograph having altered reality, design, form or components of a rose plant or any portion thereof or macro photos (extreme close-up photos of any part of the rose or rose plant).

Entries will be judged using the score card below:

SCORE CARD FOR JUDGING ROSE PHOTOGRAPHY

Conformance
Conformance to the rules of the schedule and rules of the class.
Specific Section
The Rose - The ARS Guidelines for Judging Roses will be used as a reference guide
The Rose Arrangement - The ARS Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements will be used as a reference guide.
The Rose Garden - Other plants and objects may be included, but roses should dominate. Some structure to the layout of the garden should be apparent. There should be flow, rhythm and movement within the photograph.
Rose Art/Creative Interpretation - The photograph should evoke a sense of originality and a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. Photographic technique will be given preference. Macro Photography - Clarity in the photograph and a sense of originality will be used. Extreme close-up is an aspect that MUST be followed.
Composition
Includes point of interest, simplicity, contrast, balance, framing, viewpoint, direction of movement and diagonals, where applicable.
Technique
Exposure, lighting, focus for main subject and other relevant technical factors.
Distinction
Distinction is something that sets a photograph apart from others in its class. Everything about the

Preparedness is Half the Battle! by Ted Mills, ARS Master Rosarian and Judge

Oh, how well RoseDoc remembers these important words that General Eisenhower gave the troops who were preparing to launch boats bound for the beaches of Normandy. Eisenhower knew the cost of life would be high. Every military tactic learned in training was to be utilized. Enemy resistance was predicted to be strong. Allied victory had to be accomplished if the world was to remain free.

The Deep Freeze days 2014 and 2015 brought back memories of cold weather during World War II's "Battle of the Bulge." There was no way to cope with the frigid conditions visiting our fox holes. Growing roses was a formidable task under those frigid conditions. Dedicated rosarians lost many rose bushes, but their interest in the flowers trumped any rosarian's desire to eliminate this cherished hobby.

Now that we have dealt with the real war, RoseDoc wants to mention things that will help the rosarian become more astute in this revered hobby. We begin with education. There is much to learn about rose culture and the most convenient place is the local rose society. Here is one thing that the average rosarian will gladly do share information to interested fellow members. It would be well if each rose meeting would include a question and answer period involving CRs. Tri-State Rose Society has a membership total of 118. Why did this rapid growth occur? The solid increase in membership came about because members Jeff and Cindy Garrett had a strong desire to see their society grow. Both of these individuals are CRs and are well versed in all phases of rose

culture. They have won many ARS awards and unselfishly help all seeking help in rose matters.


Winter months provide a time to improve on rose culture through reading. The American Rose Society has a storehouse of rose articles. They are eager to let you read them. The computer has a vast supply of articles on almost every phase of rose growing. Log on to the ARS website and I am sure they will make them available to you. Cozy up to the fireplace this winter and read this avalanche of rose wisdom.

There are several ways that a respite will enable you to improve your rose growing. Winter is a prime time to service your equipment. First and foremost, keep an eve on the rose bushes. Is there an abundance of non-productive canes that need pruning? Also, tag the weak and decayed bushes and be sure to remove them from the garden. Keeping sickly bushes is a waste of time and money. Let's examine the equipment. Oil the metal tools to prevent rust. After cleaning the sprayer thoroughly, be sure to store it in a dry place.

Every novice rose grower needs to manage this hobby. Never let it lead you to planting an overabundance of rose bushes. Sometimes the novice is spellbound by the beauty of the roses and overindulges in the hobby. Plant only the number of bushes that can be cared for well.

Yes, winter is the proper time to fulfill chores that will lessen the work-load come spring. The hobby that we rosarians dearly love requires attention year-round. Mother Nature causes our work-load to increase especially in sub-freezing

weather. As General Eisenhower so wisely said: "Men, the battle ahead is going to be tough; prepare yourself as best you can and vic-



tory will be ours."

RoseDoc wrote a well-deserved article patronizing hybridizers. He mentioned the old timers who ushered in the hobby of beauty. It is also true that there are others of late that need recognition. In our own society, we have rosarians who are the real reason our club keeps growing. Who among us can match the contributions that the late Roy Guthrie advanced in his little red truck? The Garretts are tremendous as is Clayton Beaty. In fact, all of our members share credit for making Tri-State Rose Society the envy of other clubs.

Ted Mills is a member of the Tri-State Rose Society of Chattanooga and wrote this article for their newsletter. He was willing to share it with the rest of our district.
